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LETTER FROM THE HEALTH OFFICER

Dear Washington & Ozaukee County Residents,

As I reflect on 2025, it stands out as a challenging year marked by budgetary uncertainty, as funding cuts affected Public Health and grant reporting requirements changed almost daily. Our WIC program operated through a federal funding freeze and successfully adapted to a temporary government shutdown in October, while the rest of our team prepared for a potential Measles outbreak in our counties. These particular challenges were reminiscent of similar struggles we faced during the COVID-19 pandemic, underscoring the importance of fiscal responsibility and proactive financial planning when preparing not only for large scale public health emergencies, but also our annual operating budget.

Despite these hurdles, we achieved several significant milestones. We completed the Community Health Improvement Planning process, increased our presence at community events, and made meaningful progress toward accreditation readiness. We reached record-high participation in the WIC program despite the government shutdown with two consecutive months of the highest enrollment to date. Throughout the year, we remained steadfast in our mission, working collaboratively and supporting each other to provide high quality services to our residents. This commitment was further demonstrated when we were invited to present a session on *Public Health Communication Strategies that Bridge Political Divides* at the Wisconsin Public Health Association Conference in May, a testament to our organizational capabilities and innovative approach to problem solving.

Looking ahead to 2026, we are focused on several key objectives, including completion of our accreditation readiness assessment, beginning the PHAB Pathways process, and an early DHS 140 review. This will allow us to gain a clearer understanding of our strengths, identify areas for improvement, and chart the path for continued growth. Thank you for your ongoing support and partnership as we work together to build a healthier, more resilient community.

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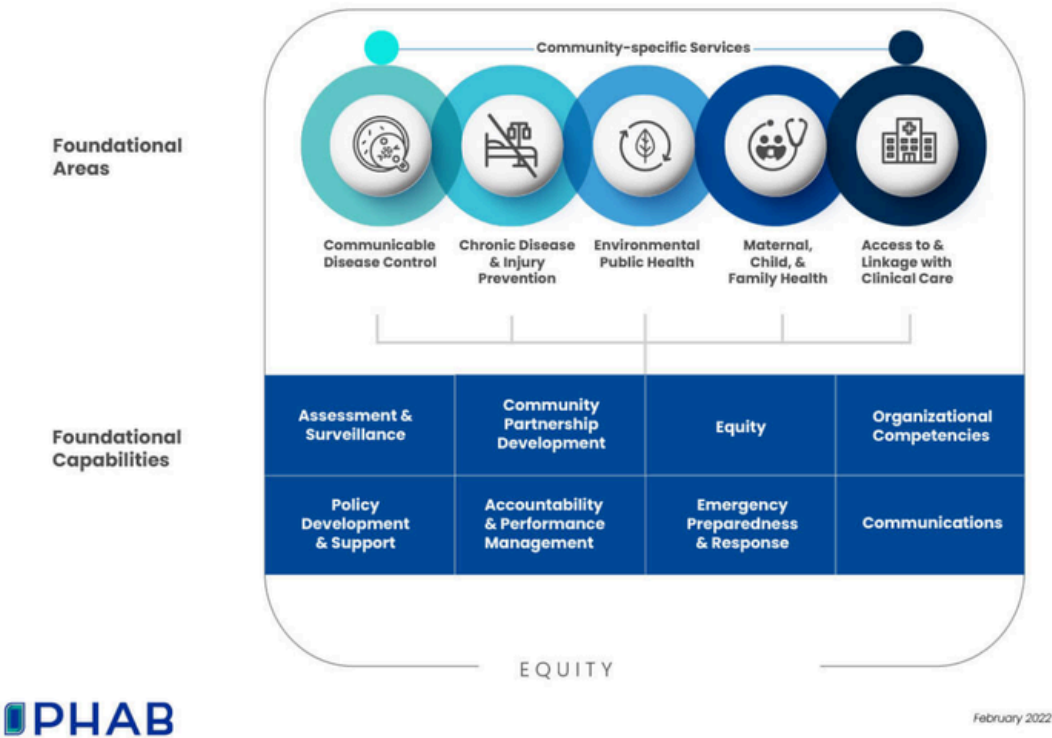


GUIDING PRINCIPLES

As you read through this report, you'll see how these foundational principles continued to shape and guide our programs, services, and strategic priorities throughout 2025.

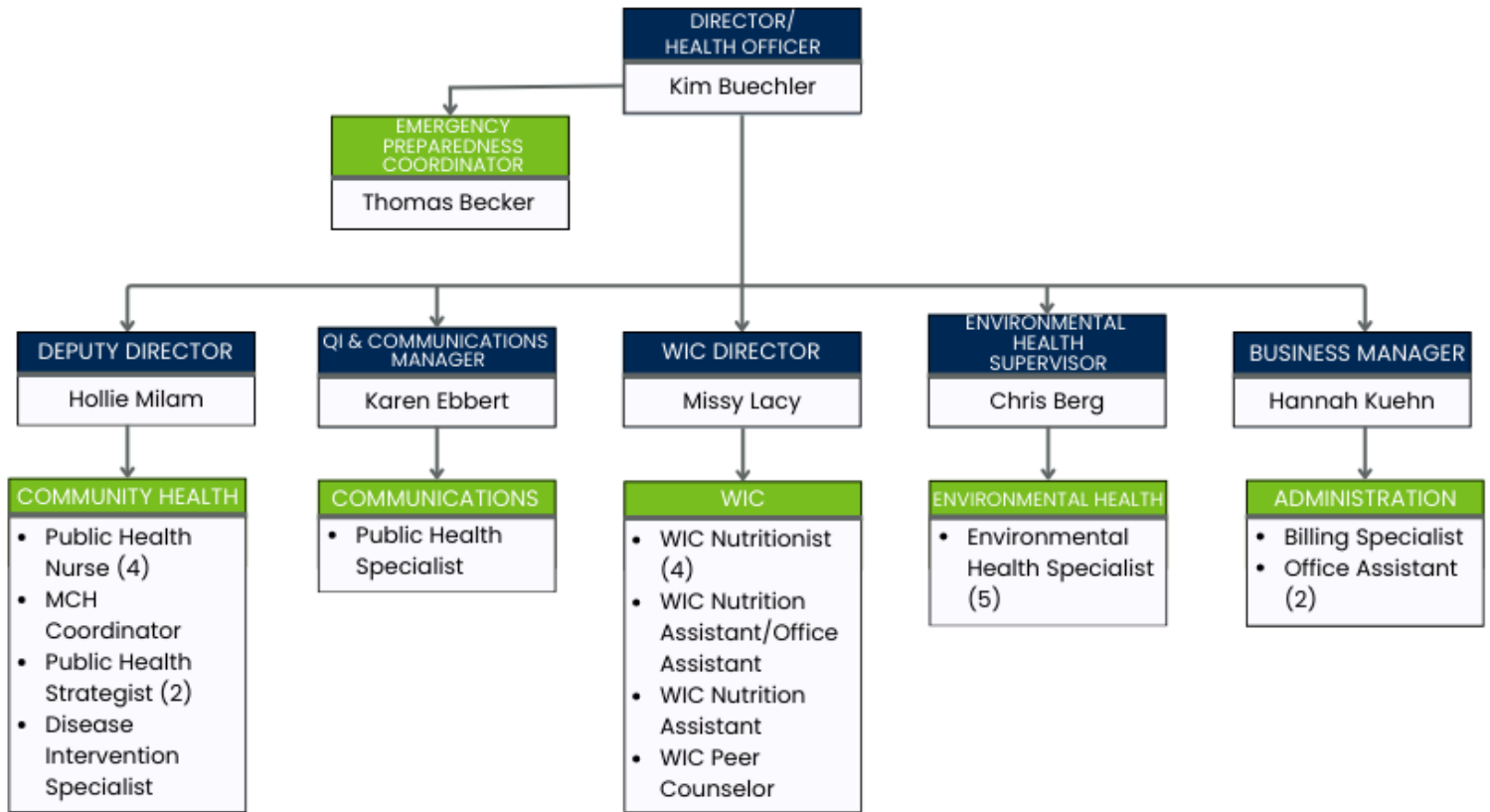

HEALTH RANKINGS

County Health Rankings collects data for every county in the United States annually and provides a state ranking. Health outcomes tell us how long people live on average within a community, and how much physical and mental health people experience in a community while they are alive. In 2025, both counties continued to score significantly higher than the national and state averages.



EMPLOYEE ENGAGEMENT

Employee engagement plays a vital role in creating a positive work environment, strengthening relationships amongst employees and increasing staff involvement within the department.

The Health Department's 2022-2025 Strategic Plan identified employee engagement as a key priority, particularly in fostering active community involvement and cultivating enduring partnerships with other organizations to strengthen or role and trust within our community. Throughout 2025, staff eagerly embraced innovative and collaborative opportunities for community engagement, which not only expanded our visibility in the community but also provided staff with valuable chances to cross-train, deepen existing relationships with colleagues, and often step beyond their usual roles and comfort zones. Each year, Health Department staff also engage in a county-wide employee survey that provides them with an opportunity to voice their perspectives on the workplace environment. Public health staff engagement increased from 73% to 80% in 2025, a positive reflection of the department's ongoing focus on employee engagement throughout the year and the efforts to enhance workplace culture.

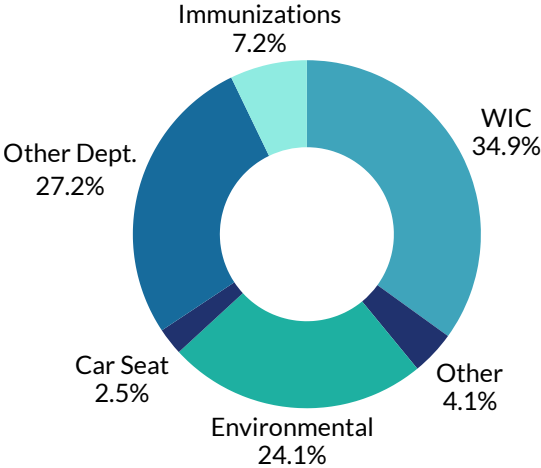

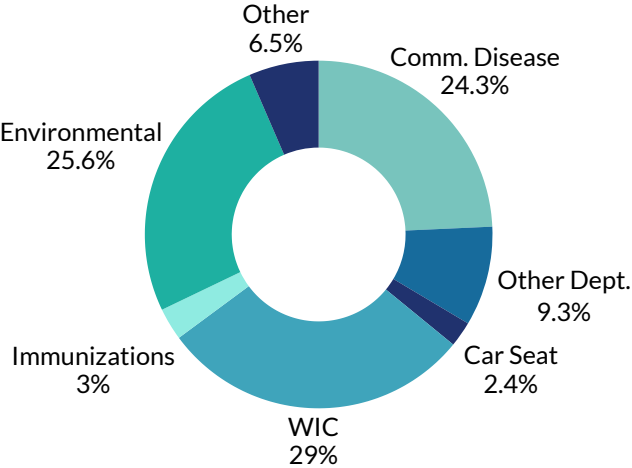


ADMINISTRATION

2025 was a year of significant growth for our billing team, as they successfully implemented new billing processes through the complex Tuberculosis Ordering & Billing Interface (TOBI) and developed procedures for billing of new programs and services. Additionally, our Business Manager was invited to join the planning committee for the 2025 Wisconsin Human Services Financial Managers Association Conference. Alongside our Billing Specialist, she also participated in a Public Health billing panel session at this conference, taking advantage of valuable networking opportunities with other professionals in the medical billing field.

COMMUNITY HEALTH

Our community health team encompasses a variety of programs & services dedicated to communicable disease control, chronic disease & injury prevention, maternal & child health, access to clinical care, and community partnership development.

Communicable Disease

Surveillance, investigation, and follow-up of reportable diseases are statutory responsibilities of local health departments. Follow-up is conducted by our nursing team to ensure appropriate measures are taken to prevent potential disease transmission. A noticeable increase in vector borne illnesses over previous years could be attributed to an increase in the tick population, improved reporting protocols and increased public awareness, leading to early detection and treatment.

Wisconsin Well Woman Program

This program provides preventative screening services for breast and cervical cancer to low income, uninsured or underinsured women residing in Wisconsin.

This program welcomed 7 new enrollments in 2025.

In October, we partnered with Casa Guadalupe and Lakeshore Community Health Care for a breast cancer screening event.

Immunizations

The health department aims to reduce or eliminate vaccine preventable diseases. Staff work closely with school districts to ensure school age children are in compliance with the Wisconsin State Immunization Law, increasing vaccine access for all and protecting children across our counties from vaccine preventable illnesses.

155 vaccines were administered in 2025





COMMUNICATIONS

Our Quality Improvement and Communications team focused on amplifying our social media messaging and enhancing service accessibility through our website, while also expanding public outreach by organizing departmental participation at more community events.

The department took ownership of our *Change the Ending* and *Get Tested for Lead* campaigns, merging them into our department's website and ensuring continued access to vital mental health, substance use, and child health resources. Communications staff led an in-depth redesign of our website to improve user experience and streamline service navigation. Our social media presence was further strengthened by strategically promoting new and pre-existing services such as CPR/AED training, car seat education, and Narcan training, which are now consistently highlighted and widely shared by community partners.

Looking ahead to 2026, QI & Communications staff are focused on supporting key initiatives including implementation of our 2026-2028 strategic plan, advancing accreditation readiness through the PHAB Pathways program, and the move of our website to a new platform.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

Our emergency preparedness focus is on preparing for and responding to events that pose a substantial health risk to our residents. The program supports and enhances the capacity of the health care system to prepare for public health threats and emergencies through planning, exercising, responding, and training.



May staff retreat

Every year, the health department hosts two staff retreats focused on team bonding to improve communication and foster collaboration, all of which contribute to a stronger, more cohesive work culture. At each retreat this year, we focused on emergency preparedness by playing tabletop board games created by the CDC for point of dispensing and Measles outbreak planning.

Fit testing ensures tight-fitting respirators, such as N-95s, create a proper seal against the user's face to protect against airborne hazards. We perform this test using a bitter/sweet solution and perform a series of steps to ensure staff have a tight-fitting respirator.

Disaster Recovery Center

Some areas of Washington County were hit hard in the August flooding, so a Disaster Recovery Center (DRC) was set up by FEMA and county staff to give in-person assistance with the FEMA application process and to provide other available resources. Our staff volunteered to manage the information table and assist affected residents.



Maintaining current contact lists is critical for our ability to distribute health alerts to the public in an emergency.

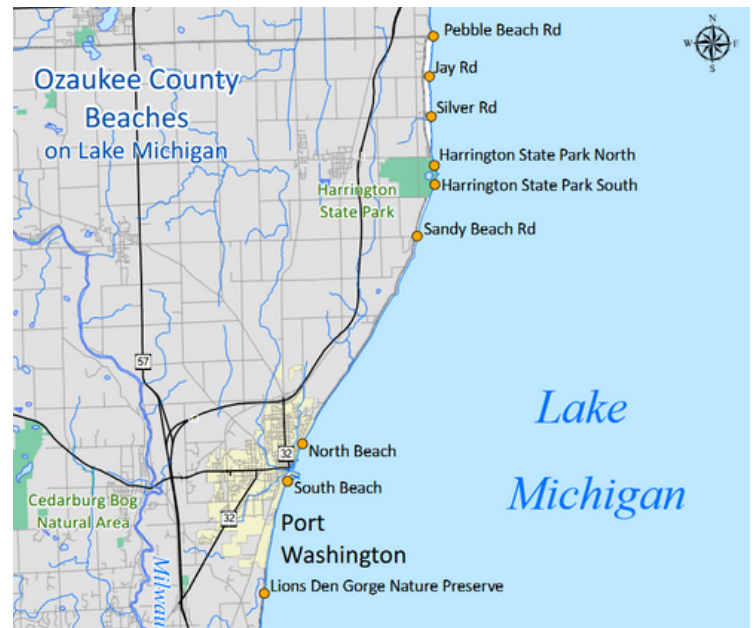
Our environmental health team focuses on the protection of human health through assessment, surveillance, control and prevention of a multitude of environmental factors which may affect the health and well-being of our community.

2025 Statistics

189 short-term radon kits
11 long-term radon kits

The health department distributes short-term and long-term radon kits to Washington and Ozaukee County residents. To celebrate National Radon Action Month in January, we provided free radon kits to individuals who donated a non-perishable food item.

From Memorial Day to Labor day, we partner with the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to implement the Wisconsin Beach Monitoring Program. Data collected helps determine when to notify the public so they can make informed choices about swimming at the beach and when to close a beach due to unsafe conditions. A sample that tests for E. coli is taken and the following routine sanitary survey parameters are assessed by our environmental health staff: water clarity, wave height, weather conditions, water temperature, gull and other animal counts and algae on the beach and in the water. This year, Public Health staff posted 9 beach advisories.

Food & Recreational Safety Program

Our registered sanitarians provide inspections, consultation and licensing services for restaurants and retail food, public swimming pools and water attractions, hotels, motels, tourist rooming houses and bed and breakfasts, tattoo and body piercing, and campgrounds.

1,439 routine licensing inspections

DNR Well Water Program

We inspect and test transient wells in Washington, Ozaukee, and Milwaukee Counties through a grant from the Wisconsin DNR. This includes an annual test for bacteria and nitrate for any well that offers public access to water for at least 25 individuals per day, for at least 60 days of the year.

419 establishments completed water testing
89 well system survey inspections were conducted



MATERNAL CHILD HEALTH

Our maternal child health (MCH) team works with families offering screening and referral for social determinant of health needs and provides prenatal, postnatal, and child specific education to area families. In 2025, our MCH team conducted developmental milestone screenings for over 235 children connecting families to additional resources when further evaluation is needed.

In 2025, the MCH team had 1,340 encounters with 443 WIC clients.

1,043 unique needs were identified and most clients identified 3 needs or less.

CPR TRAINING

In 2025, we began offering CPR training to businesses, community members, and county employees! With two BLS CPR instructors/instructor trainers on staff who are certified through the American Heart Association, we offer general education classes that provide education on CPR, First Aid, Stop the Bleed, and Narcan. In addition to this class, our trainers also teach certification and recertification classes.

We provided a combination of education, certification, and recertification to over 50 individuals through this new program.





CAR SEAT TEAM

This year we welcomed two new car seat technicians to the car seat team due to increased demand for car seat inspections and distributions. We also spent more time at outreach events this year educating families about the benefits of getting their car seats checked, as the National Highway Traffic Safety Association (NHTSA) reports 46% of all car seats are installed incorrectly.



Car Seat Safety Team

Our car seat team attended the annual International Kidz in Motion Child Passenger Safety Conference in August in Madison, WI.

This conference allowed us to:

- talk directly with car seat manufacturers
- get hands-on experience installing and testing features of new car seats
- learn about the latest product updates
- attend workshops to earn required credits towards recertification





Car Seat Event

Our car seat team hosted a community car seat event in partnership with Safe Kids Worldwide and State Farm in September. This FREE event allowed participants to:

- work with a certified car seat technician
- learn how to properly install their car seat
- check to see if their car seat is installed properly
- receive a car seat- while supplies last, regardless of income status

The car seat team also attended National Night Out and interacted with over **400** people!

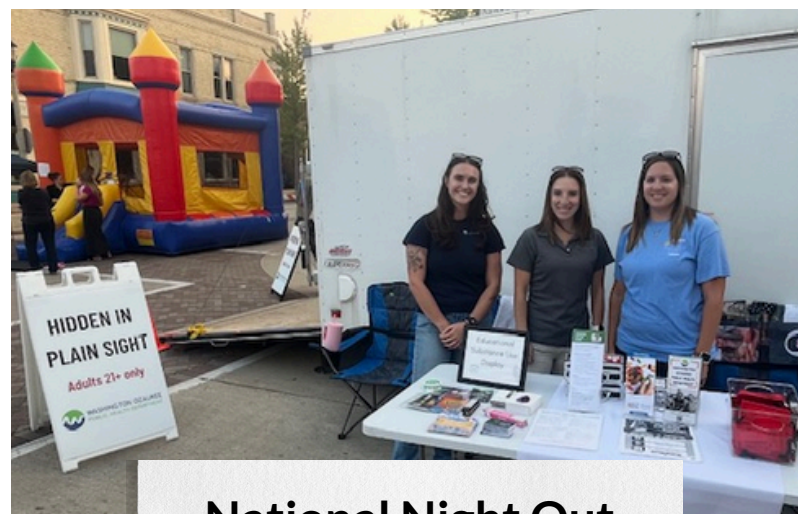

National Night Out



STRATEGY

Our health strategy team leads health education efforts out in the community and facilitates community coalitions to address key health priorities at the individual, family, & community levels to improve the health and well-being of our residents.

Harm reduction strategies are essential to community health, offering practical, evidence-based tools that protect individual and community health while promoting dignity, safety, and access to care. Methods such as naloxone, condoms, fentanyl test strips, and Detera medication disposal bags save lives and prevent illness by reducing the risks associated with drug use and sexual activity.

The following harm reduction supplies were distributed this year by our team:

Naloxone: 514 doses

Fentanyl test strips: 14

Condoms: 59

Detera bags: 14

The Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS) is a set of reliable surveys conducted every two years for grades 9-12 that identify risk behaviors that may contribute to poor health. Data collection helps determine areas of focus for health improvement and provides a platform for the development of subsequent programming aimed at improving health outcomes. Port Washington - Saukville School District completed the YRBS in 2025. This survey will give the school district a more accurate picture of student health vs. relying on state reports from students in other counties and our goal is to have more schools in our counties participate in future years.



IOAD Event

The Substance Use Coalition hosted International Overdose Awareness Day (IOAD) in both Washington and Ozaukee Counties. The day was to honor and remember our loved ones that have lost their lives due to an overdose, and to find community among others who may struggle with substance use or are in active recovery. Approximately 70 people attended this event.

Our Hidden in Plain Sight trailer was displayed at the Washington & Ozaukee County Fairs, National Night Out, and Grafton High School for parent-teacher conferences this year. The trailer is used to inform and foster discussions around youth substance use and is open to individuals age 21+. Health department staff shared substance use resources and distributed medication lock boxes at these events.

STRATEGY

The health department, Ozaukee County Sheriff's Office, Sirona Recovery, Concordia University Wisconsin School of Pharmacy and Washington County Sheriff's Office, in cooperation with the Wisconsin Department of Justice (DOJ) and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), participate in National Prescription Drug Take Back Day in the Spring and Fall. This event provides a safe, convenient, and responsible means of medication disposal.



361.2 pounds of non-controlled and controlled substances were collected in 2025.

Medication Disposal

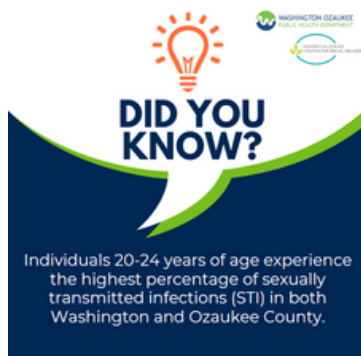
This year, participants had the opportunity to take an optional survey that would be used to make decisions about future events and identify any areas to improve prescription medication storage and disposal in our community. Since the majority of participants reported they don't know where they can dispose medications throughout the year, we are now promoting year-round medication disposal locations on our social media on a quarterly basis.

The Washington Ozaukee Sexual Wellness Coalition hosted two *Relationships, Responsibility, and Sexual Health* presentations in partnership with Froedtert & the Medical College of Wisconsin and Cedarburg Parents for Responsible Human Growth and Development. Middle school students were invited to a free presentation focused on reproductive health, STIs, and healthy relationships.



86% of participants reported feeling confident in making healthy decisions about relationships and personal boundaries after attending this class.

In addition to this presentation, the coalition introduced a STI social media campaign focused on highlighting the importance of getting tested before engaging in sexual activity.

National Public Health Week - April 7th-13th

During National Public Health Week, our strategy team was invited on *The Fireman Kenny Show Podcast* to talk about what public health is, why public health is important, and the 3 P's of public health: prevention, protection, and promotion of health. Our team shared some basic practices to prevent illness and disease and discussed targeting risk factors in programming and education. This type of promotion is important for garnering attention for the work we do including sharing information on how community members can collaborate for improved community health.

Washington and Ozaukee Counties Implement Fatality Review Teams

Suicide is a serious public health issue with far-reaching consequences for individuals, families, and communities. According to the National Action Alliance for Suicide Prevention, 91% of U.S adults believe that suicide can be prevented at least some of the time, and 95% say they would act if someone close to them were considering suicide.

To address suicide and overdose trends, the Health Department in partnership with each county's Human Services Department, Medical Examiner's Office, and Sheriff's Office, is launching a bi-county Fatality Review Team (FRT) to review selected fatal cases of overdose and suicide among individuals aged 19 and over in Washington and Ozaukee Counties, to begin in January 2026.

The goals of the FRT are to:

1. Recognize and address gaps or barriers in services
2. Identify underlying causes and trends in suicide and substance use
3. Develop prevention strategies targeting mental health and substance use
4. Recommend policy or program changes at local and state levels

From 2021 to 2024, there were 96 suicides and 129 fatal overdoses across Washington and Ozaukee Counties.

Our strategists are responsible for our Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP), which is a long-term plan that outlines our community's top health priorities as determined by data from local health assessments, every 3-5 years.

Throughout the summer, we displayed data at local libraries, public events, and shared broadly on social media and in print to catch the attention of a wide variety of individuals. We also hosted three in-person sessions.

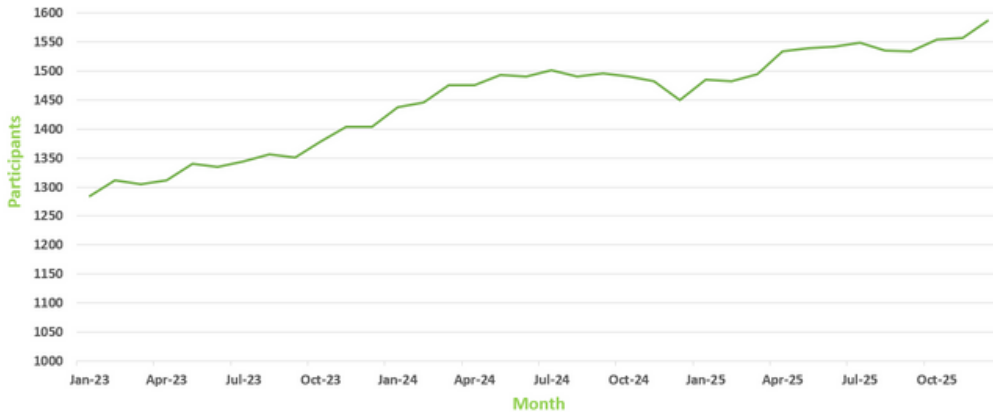




WOMEN, INFANTS AND CHILDREN

The Women, Infants and Children (WIC) nutrition program provides food and nutrition information to pregnant, postpartum, breastfeeding women, infants and children under the age of 5.

Our WIC department experienced funding uncertainties beginning early in the year and navigated a temporary government shutdown in October. There were also funding changes to the Farmers' Market Nutrition Program this year. As a result, we received 75% of typically allocated checks and the dollar amount given to participants was reduced to \$25/booklet, but the redemption rate of vouchers increased over previous years.



Our team reached record-high caseloads in July with 1,549 enrolled participants and again in December with 1,584 enrolled participants!

In partnership with United Way and Kids2Kids of Ozaukee County, WIC hosted a holiday event to distribute toys to children and provide nutritional education.

Community Connections Event

This year we hosted our 5th annual Community Connections event, inviting WIC families and community families with young children in need to attend a drive-thru resource fair in each county. Due to the Farmers' Market Nutrition Program grant funding changes, checks were not distributed as they have been in previous years, however 184 children in the WIC program were able to be connected to other resources in our counties through this event.

17 Chairperson Schulteis called the meeting to order at 8:34 am. Notice of Posting was given.
18

19 **MEETING MINUTES**

20 No corrections were made to the minutes. The minutes are approved.
21

22 **COMMUNICABLE DISEASE REPORT**

23 Ms. Buechler reported that the year-end report will be presented at the March meeting. Current
24 disease trends follow typical seasonal patterns seen in the fall and winter, with noted increases in
25 influenza and pertussis cases. One influenza-related death was reported in the counties.
26

27 **WIC PROGRAM REPORT**

28 The WIC program followed similar participation trends during the summer and fall months. A
29 decline in benefit redemption occurred during the fall, attributed to the government shutdown.
30 While operations remain unchanged, the shift in the fiscal year has added complexity to financial
31 reporting. Ms. Buechler highlighted a positive Ozaukee Press story featuring the toy drive,
32 noting it was both enjoyable and beneficial for the community. Year-end statistics will be
33 presented at the March meeting.
34

35 **PRESENTATION – 2026-2030 COMMUNITY HEALTH IMPROVEMENT PLAN**

36 Ms. Weiland provided an overview of the Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP)
37 development process, including community partner involvement, listening sessions, and survey
38 responses. The decision to transition from a five-year plan to a three-year plan was made to
39 better align with healthcare systems.
40

41 Mr. Hafeman discussed how data was collected and analyzed and summarized key findings. The
42 data identified substance use, mental health, and nutrition as priority health issues within the
43 community, which will guide the formation of coalitions to address these needs. The findings
44 were verified through the Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) and showed consistent
45 results. Also reviewed were the methods used for conducting listening sessions and for gathering
46 and compiling detailed information.

1 Questions on survey accessibility and the structure of survey and listening session questions.

2
3 **PUBLIC HEALTH DIRECTOR UPDATES**

4 January is Radon Action Month, with efforts focused on community education and the
5 distribution of radon test kits in conjunction with a food donation initiative. Listening sessions
6 were held in January to address the new Community Health Improvement Plan. The December
7 toy drive event was successful and is likely to return in 2026. The annual report is currently
8 being compiled using 2025 data and will be presented at the March meeting. The department
9 website has been rebuilt to improve navigation and is scheduled to launch in January. The
10 department has begun the accreditation readiness process, which includes revising policies and
11 procedures to meet national standards, and the state has offered funding support for this effort.
12 Progress updates will be shared with the Board throughout the process.

13
14 **APPROVAL OF 2026 LODGING LICENSING FEES**

15 The proposed fee structure is based on state inspection fees, as the department acts as an agent of
16 the state to conduct these inspections. The proposal includes a 15% increase over current state
17 fees.

18
19 Mr. Berg provided background on the food and recreation inspection program, explained how
20 the state periodically revises the inspection code, and emphasized the importance of adjusting
21 fees to keep pace with program costs.

22

25 Questions on potential tax levy impact, fee increase amount, and whether additional fee changes
26 are anticipated in the future.

27
28 The proposed 2026 lodging licensing fees were agreed to by Board consensus, effective April
29 2026.

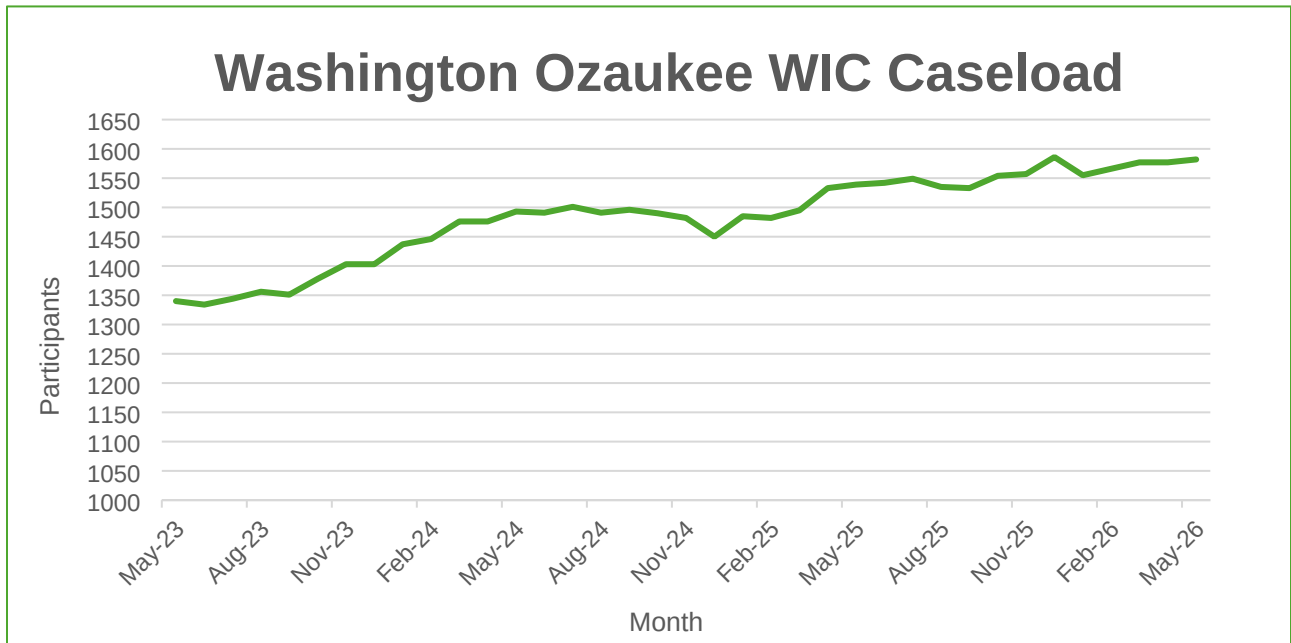

Update from National WIC Association:

ARPA waivers that allow for remote WIC services are extended through fiscal Year 2027 so FNS can complete evaluation for remote services.

House Passes Agriculture Funding Bill with Cuts to WIC

“Earlier this month, the House proposed fiscal year 2027 (FY27) agriculture appropriations bill on a largely party-line vote. The measure would provide \$8 billion in funding for WIC in FY27, a cut of \$200 million from current funding, and cut WIC’s fruit and vegetable benefit by 10 percent. With food costs continuing to rise, this proposed funding level risks turning eligible families away from WIC for the first time in 30 years. Additionally, the measure fails to extend current flexible service options, which are only available due to a short-term waiver and will require Congressional authority to be made permanent. The Senate is expected to begin consideration of its own agriculture funding bill soon.”

99% know they can buy more than the voucher amount, they can use multiple voucher or their own money
